Elul is the time when we begin to prepare ourselves for the deep moral and religious assessment that takes place on the High Holy Days. An old tradition points out that the Hebrew letters of Elul can stand for the verse from the biblical book of Song of Songs (6:3), Ani L'dodi V'dodi Li -- "I am my beloved's, and my beloved is mine." The tradition is based on Rabbi Akiva's interpretation of that book as the love poetry not just between a man and a woman but also between God and the People Israel. The point is that in preparing ourselves to engage with our Maker, we are coming closer to God. During the coming days and weeks as we prepare for the holidays, I encourage each of us to embrace this Jewish tradition and express our love for those we hold dearest in our lives. *L'Shanah Tovah U'm'tukah*. #### Religious School 2012 - 2013

**Our School:** The Religious School at TBS is a multi-generational class, working with families of diverse backgrounds to meet the need of Hebrew language and Jewish culture in the Conservative community.

TBS classes start the week after Yom Kippur run until early June. Classes are held twice per week, Sunday morning and Thursday evening.

**Our Goal:** To educate Jewish youth and adults, increasing language skills and familiarity with customs, holidays and traditions.

**Our Objective:** To provide all students with classroom instruction and multigenerational discussion, teaching Conservative Jewish values, culture and language.

#### **Our Curriculum includes:**

- Aleph Bet Hebrew letters & vowels.
- Hebrew counting (numbers),
- Hebrew vocabulary,
- Jewish Holidays and traditions,
- Bible stories.
- Ten Commandments.
- Torah blessings,
- Haphtarah blessings,
- Shabbat prayers and other Blessings,
- ♦ Israeli geography and history

#### **Our Instructor:**

Solomon Borocov is a longtime Temple B'nai Shalom member and leader in our Shabbat Services. Solomon is originally from the Soviet Union, moving to Israel as a child. ## Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur

What are the Days of Awe? This is a ten day period that falls sometime in September or October. This year it begins on Sunday evening, September 16, Erev Rosh Hashanah, and ends with the conclusion of our Yom Kippur services on Wednesday, September 26. This period begins with the celebration of Rosh Hashanah and ends with Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, the most solemn and introspective day of the year. This ten day period is known as Yamin Nora'im - Days of Awe. Jews seek forgiveness for their sins, but individually, they try to become better people, seeking reconciliation with others and asking forgiveness for any sins committed against them. G-D will only forgive sins committed against him, but individuals must also ask forgiveness for unjust treatment of another person.

It is believed that G-D has a heavenly ledger, "Sefer HA-Chayim", The Book of Life. During the Days of Repentance, G-D writes down the names of those who will have a good life and those who will not, those who will live and those who will die in the coming year. The Book of Life is opened on Rosh Hashanah and closes at the end of Yom kippur. Our actions can alter the initial determination, so prayer, Tefilah, good deeds and charity, Tzedakah, and turning or returning to G-D, Teshuvah, are all very important.

The Sabbath that occurs during the Ten Days of Awe is called the Sabbath of Return, Shabbat Shuvah. The special Haftorah is read and a long sermon about repentance is often given from the Books of the Prophets, Hosea, Micah and Joel.

**What is a Shofar?** It is a trumpet made of a ram's horn. It was blown in biblical times to herald important events, such as holy days, the new moon and preparation for war. It also symbolizes Abraham's aborted sacrifice of Isaac, when a ram was offered in place of Isaac. The shofar is sounded for a total of 100 notes on each day, with the final blast called "Tekiah Gedolah".

**What is Tashlikh?** This ritual of "casting off" involves walking to a body of water, reciting specific prayers and tossing bread into the water. This symbolizes casting off our sins and is observed on the afternoon of the first day of Rosh Hashanah, unless it falls on Shabbat. It is then postponed to the next day, since Shabbat takes precedence over any other day.

What is the prevalent color of Yom Kippur? White is the prevalent color. More observant men often wear a Kittel, a white ankle length robe over their clothes. Both the Rabbi and Cantor wear white robes. The Torah Scrolls are dressed in white and the table on which they are read, is covered in white.

What service concludes the Yom Kippur service? It is called NEILAH, meaning locked. It symbolizes the closing of the Gates of Heaven. It concludes with a very long blast of the Shofar.

#### Sukkot, Shemini Atzeret, Simchat Torah

Just five days after Yom Kippur, we celebrate the seven day festival of Sukkot, followed by Shemini Atzeret and then Simchat Torah. The holidays, laden with history and special meaning, are a joyous time of celebration that involves activities and observances all carried out in a spirit of jubilation. Sukkot, also a harvest festival, is a time for rejoicing. It is referred to as Zeman Simkhateinu, the Season of Our Rejoicing.

On Shemini Atzeret, we ask G-D to intervene for a good harvest, we pray for rain, Geshem, and we recite Yizkor, remembering the deceased.

Simchat Torah is the celebration of the Torah. It marks the juncture where the Jews complete the cycle of the Torah Readings each year. The last chapter of Deuteronomy is read and then we begin again with the first chapter of Genesis, as the cycle continues.

In some congregations, each member of the Congregation is given the opportunity to dance and parade with the Holy scrolls. This done by conducting seven Hokafot, seven revolutions. Children join in with miniature Torahs, banners or flags with apples on top. Treats are given to children.

During the morning service, the last aliyah is given to all children under age 13. All stand under the large Talit, like a canopy, and recite the blessings over the Torah!
