Dear Temple B'nai Shalom Members,

As we prepare for the High Holy Days, there are a few things we'd like to bring to your attention. Rosh Hashanah begins the eve of October 2nd and we need to make plans for seats and honors.

All services will be held at Temple B'nai Shalom at 41 Storrs Avenue in Braintree. Rabbi Lanckton and Cantor Grossman will lead the services. Please check the calendar below for times and dates of services.

Every attempt will be made to assign you an honor, if you have requested your seats by September 6. Help us meet our deadline by completing, then mailing your check with the form mailed to you. If for some reason you have not received notice of your honor by September 12th or if you are unable to perform the Mitzvah allocated, please call Janice Fine at 508-203-5074,

We respectfully request that all who ascend the bimah for a mitzvah:

Wear head coverings and a tallis (talleism optional for women)

Dress modestly (i.e. no bare shoulders, no bare midriffs, no short shirts, etc.)

Ascend from the right (as you face the bimah) and descend from the left

Do not chew gum or eat candy.

The downstairs will be available for the children. Preschoolers must be accompanied by an adult. We will provide a sitter as needed. We will be planning this with you as we understand your intentions.

Cell phones - Should be turned off and not used with on Temple grounds. Preferably, leave your phone in the car or at home.

Quiet toys - May be brought by parents to amuse the children. Hand held electronic games may be used downstairs with the audio off. Appropriate games only (no violence).

Please!!!!- No coloring books, crayons, or drawing materials,

Refreshments – Will be provided. In observance of Kashrut, please do not bring food into the temple.

Please be aware that certain portions of the service require that the sanctuary doors remain closed.

The ushers will open the doors when it is appropriate for you to come in. We ask for your understanding and cooperation.

A list of the departed will be printed for use at Yizkor service on Yom Kippur morning. Please complete and return your remembrances on the form enclosed in your package. Only the names sent to us will be included in the Yizkor Book. Names for those who have departed this past year will be read.

As in all years for High Holy Days, it is our desire that services be meaningful for our temple members. We work very hard to assure that this does come about. If you have questions, concerns, recommendations regarding our services, please contact Marylou Fishman at 617-773-3567.

Message from Rabbi Van Lanckton

THE HOLIDAYS APPROACH: ARE WE READY?

My dear friends,

This fall I will give four sermons: one for each of the two days of Rosh Hashanah, one for Kol Kidre and one for Yom Kippur.

One topic I know I will address in some fashion is our presidential election November 8.

Late last month I sent an email to congregation inviting you to let me know if there are other topics you would like me to discuss, or if there is any aspect of the election you would particularly like me to include in my sermon on that topic.

I repeat that invitation here. If you have a suggestion, please send it to me at vlanckton@verizon.net or call me at 617-694-2438 to discuss it. All of your ideas are welcome.

It's not just the rabbi, however who needs to get ready for the approaching holidays. We all have work to do and tasks to accomplish.

In the month that precedes Rosh Hashanah, the month of Elul, our tradition invites us to visit the graves of our dear departed to pay respect to their memories. We can of course do this at any time in the year. But Elul represents our last opportunity before the Jewish calendar advances to another year.

Elul begins on September 4 and ends on October 2. Please consider setting aside the time for a visit to the cemetery. Bring a stone from your home or pick one up there and place it on the gravestone as an indicator that the person you are visiting has been honored and remembered. Another way that some do this is to tie blades of grass into a knot near the stone, or bring sea shells from a place loved by the departed.

Before we gather at Temple B'nai Shalom on Sunday evening, October 2, Erev Rosh Hashanah, we have our annual opportunity to reflect on our relationships and consider whom we may have wronged and from whom we should ask forgiveness. Make it specific. "I'm sorry for anything I may have done or omitted to do in the past year" is a kind of apology that is better than none. But still better is an apology that carries an implicit or explicit promise to do better in 5777.

May we enter into the New Year with renewed hope for a year of joy and peace.

We will also be holding our annual Congregational meeting on October 22,

we will be holding our installation of officers and directors as part of our Shabbat morning service. I hope you will join us. On Sunday, October 30, we will be holding Genealogy II. Even if you didn't attend the first session, this is open to everyone. The Sisterhood will be holding rummage on Sunday, November 6 and Monday, November 7th and in between Yom Kippur and rummage, we will be celebrating Sukkoth. It will be a busy fall.

I can't end this article without making a pitch for attending services, even a few more times than you have this past year, and for volunteering to help out. Our temple can only survive through your financial support AND volunteer efforts. We need help in the kitchen on a few Shabbats during the year. We have many congregants who sponsor a Kiddush for both joyful events and yahrzeits, and we could use more assistance. Join the Men's Club or Sisterhood. Do you have an idea for a Temple program? 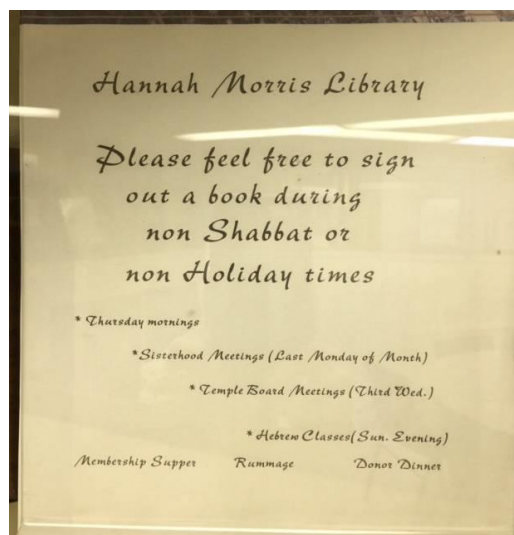


HOLOCAUST STAMP COLLECTION UPDATE MERYL SMITH, CHAIR

TAKE A WALK

Jewish Cultural Walking Tour of Boston

Advance purchase strongly suggested. Tours often sell out.

We meet at the strictly kosher Milk Street Café, where you can choose to come early and have lunch or a snack before our tour. We then ascend Beacon Hill's "back side", where Jews and blacks resided during the nineteenth century. Visit the historic Vilna Shul in the center of Beacon Hill and pass by some typical Jewish homes. You'll see the West End House, where Boston's West End Jews were provided social services and the Puffer House Cigar-Rolling Factory, typical of the work locales of Boston's Jews.

We'll go through Boston's impressive and impactful Holocaust Memorial in one of Boston's oldest neighborhoods and then conclude our tour at the entrance to the North End, which was a Jewish immigrant enclave before the arrival of newly arrived Italians transformed the area into a "Little Italy" around the turn of the century.

ROSH HASHANAH

...In the seventh month, on the first of the month, there shall be a Sabbath for you, a remembrance with shofar blasts, and a holy convocation – Leviticus 16:24

Rosh Hashanah occurs on the first and second days of Tishri. In Hebrew, Rosh Hashanah means, literally, “head of the year” or “first of the year.” Rosh Hashanah is commonly known as the Jewish New Year. This name is somewhat deceptive, because there is a little similarity between Rosh Hashanah, one of the holiest days of the year, and the American midnight drinking bash and daytime football game.

There is, however, one important similarity between the Jewish New Year and the American one: Many Americans use the New Year as a time to plan a better life, making “resolutions.” Likewise, the Jewish New Year is a time to begin introspection, looking back at the mistakes of the past year and planning the changes to make in the new year.

The name “Rosh Hashanah” is not used in the Bible to discuss the holiday. The Bible refers to the holiday as Yom Ha-Zikkaron (the day of remembrance) or Yom Teruah (the day of the sounding of the shofar.) The holiday is instituted in Leviticus 23:24-25.

The shofar is a ram’s horn which is blown somewhat like a trumpet. One of the most important observances of this holiday is hearing the sounding of the shofar in the synagogue. A total of 100 notes are sounded each day. There are four different types of shofar notes: **tekiah**, a 3 second sustained note; **shevarim**, three 1-second notes rising in tone; **teruah**, a series of short, staccato notes extending over a period of about 3 seconds; and **tekiah gedolah** (literally, “big tekiah”) the final blast in a set which lasts 10 seconds minimum. Tekiah Shevarim-TeruahTekiah the bible gives no special reason for this practice. One that has been suggested is that the shofar’s sound is a call of repentance. The shofar is not blown if the holiday falls on Shabbat.

No work is done on this day. A special prayer book called the machzor is used Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, due to the extensive liturgical changes for these holidays.

Another popular observance during this holiday is eating apples dipped in honey.

Another practice of the holiday is **Tashlikh** (“casting off”). Going to flowing water on the first afternoon and emptying our pockets into the river, symbolically casting off our sins.

The common greeting at this time is **L’shanah tovah – for a good year. This is a shortening of L’shanah tovah tikatev v’taihatem” (or to women, “L’shanah tovah tikatevi v’taihatemi”)** Which means “May you be inscribed and sealed for a good year.

THE DAYS OF AWE

The ten days starting with Rosh Hashanah and ending with Yom Kippur are commonly known as the Days of Awe (Yamim Noraim) or the Days of Repentance. This is a time for serious introspection, a time to consider the sins of the previous year and repent before Yom Kippur.

YOM KIPPUR

The most important holiday of the Jewish year. The name means “Day of Atonement.” It is a day set aside to “afflict the soul,” to atone for the sins of the past year.

Days of Awe, Yom Kippur atones only for sins between man and G-d, not for the sins against another person. To atone for sins against another person, you must first seek reconciliation with that person, righting the wrongs you committed against them if possible. That must all be done before Yom Kippur.

Yom Kippur is a complete Sabbath; no work can be performed on that day. You should refrain from eating and drinking. The Talmud also specifies additional restrictions that are less well-known: washing and bathing, anointing one’s body (with cosmetics, deodorants, etc.), wearing leather shoes.

The opening evening service that begins with Kol Nidre meaning all vows as we ask G-d to annul all personal vows we may make in the next year. The concluding service, known as Ne’ilah, usually lasting one hour with the ark open so we stand. Referred to as the closing of the gates the last chance to redeem one’s self.

FOR YOM KIPPUR EVE - MEAT KREPLAKH

Everyone has their version: kreplakh, pirogi, ravioli, or wonton soup? The word “kreplakh” itself comes from the French crepe. The meat of the kreplakh symbolizes inflexible justice; the soft noodle dough denotes compassion. The kreplakh are, then, a metaphor, a suggestion that the attribute of G-d’s strict justice will be mellowed on the side of mercy.

MEAT FILLING:

1 small onion, chopped 1 egg
¾ lb left over brisket, chopped salt & pepper
1 Tablespoon of vegetable oil

1. Sauté the onion with the ground meat in the vegetable oil. Drain the excess fat.
2. Combine with the egg and salt and pepper to taste. Set aside.

NOODLE DOUGH:

3 eggs 2 Tablespoons water
¾ teaspoon salt 2 cups all-purpose flour

3. Beat the eggs slightly. Add the salt, water and enough flour to make medium-soft dough. Knead well by hand or in the food processor. Divide the dough into 2 balls. Cover with a moist towel.
4. Working quickly, roll out 1 ball of dough very thin with a rolling pin and cut into 6 strips, each 1 ½ inches wide. Then cut into pieces 1 ½ inches square.
5. Place ½ teaspoon of the meat mixture on each square. Fold into a triangle and press the edges together firmly, using flour to bind them. Leave as is or press together two of the ends. Repeat with the second ball of dough.
6. Drop into boiling water and cook, uncovered 15 minutes.

Note: after being formed the kreplakh can be placed on a cookie sheet, frozen and then transferred to plastic bags for freezer storage.

TASTY APRICOT CHICKEN – serves 6-8

This recipe is from Vivian Dinitz, wife of the late Simha Dinitz. Israeli Ambassador to the United States.

Two 3 ½ lb boiling chickens – cut into 8 pieces

Salt & Pepper

1 garlic clove

½ lb apricot preserves

6 oz Russian dressing

1 cup diced onion

- 1 Preheat the oven to 350 Degrees/
- 2 Season the chicken well with salt and pepper and rub with garlic.
- 3 Mix together the apricot preserves, Russian dressing and onion. Pour over the chicken and bake in the oven about 50 minutes, or until golden brown.
