Rabbi Lanckton's Column

Interfaith Activities This Year

Jews are a small minority of the world's population. How small? There are about 15,000,000 Jews, constituting about two tenths of one percent of the world's population of over seven billion people.

So we Jews are not just a small minority. We are a tiny minority. In many areas of the world, we are also a persecuted minority.

We are therefore extremely fortunate to live in America, and particularly in this part of America. Here, our neighbors who are not Jewish respect our religion. Here, we have opportunities to get to know our gentile neighbors, and for each to learn from the other.

I have seen this most vividly and with great pleasure this year as I have enjoyed playing an active role in the Braintree Interfaith Clergy Association:

- I attend monthly meetings with my colleagues, the clergy of the churches in Braintree.
- On February 2 we sponsored a public lecture at the Thayer Public Library that was well attended by our own members and many others from Braintree. The speaker was Professor Gregory Mobley, whom I had recommended because I had had the pleasure of learning with him at the Rabbinical School of Hebrew College. Professor Mobley teaches at Andover Newton Theological School, whose campus is next to the campus of Hebrew College. His lecture topic was "Good News and Bad News for Christians and Jews in the Parable of the Prodigal Son."
- On May 1 the Association will hold its monthly meeting in our synagogue, which has never happened before.
- On Thursday, May 10, Braintree will again celebrate a Day of Prayer. The ceremony will be held in the
 early evening at Sunset Lake, as it was last year. I hope to see many congregants there. I will join with
 my clergy colleagues in offering communal prayers.

Plans for Adult Education and Holiday Observances

Jo Salloway and Helaine Silva and I, together with other volunteers, developed the calendar of events for adult education and holiday observance this spring that you will find on page 5 of this Bulletin. The new events on this calendar include:

- The first meeting of the Book Group, on March 20 at the home of Helaine Silva.
- The celebration of Israel Independence Day on April 25.
- A discussion group to meet on three evenings in May and June to discuss Jewish tradition and concepts about important life cycle events and phases.

Adult Education by Josephine P. Salloway





Purim marks the deliverance of the entire Jewish community that lived in Persia 2500 years ago. It is fitting that it be celebrated as a community and so the focus of this holiday is the synagogue. On Purim, many people come to the synagogue in costume or join in with a parade or carnival (Purimspiel). It is a time of joy and celebration.

Each congregation hears the reading of the Book of Esther, commonly referred to as the Megillah (Scroll). The Megillah is chanted with its own melody. During the reading, it is customary to boo or hiss or shake noisemakers whenever Haman's name is read. This is called "banging Haman", an attempt to wipe out Haman's name.

Purim is a story of survival. It commemorates the work of G-d and the human capacity to bring about change. Both Mordecai and Esther performed bravely. They prayed to G-D and along with G-D's help they boldly took action to save their people.

Along with services in the synagogue, there is an emphasis on the celebration of Purim as a time of rejoicing and commemoration of the deliverance of the Jews from Haman. It is a Mitzvah to eat and drink and be merry. The primary holiday meal is served late in the afternoon, after Mincha. It is called the Purim Seudah: they are to eat bread, at least one cooked food, drink one cup of wine and whatever else they choose..

The traditional food is a delicious pastry called a Hamentaschen (Haman's pockets) or Oznei Haman (Hebrew for Haman's ears). These pastries are triangular shaped, like Haman's hat or maybe like his funny ears, and filled with fruit jams or poppy seeds.

Another tradition is to give Tzedakah. It is encouraged to send food to one another and gifts to the poor. It is a Purim tradition to send packages of food to friends, family and the poor; these packages are called in Hebrew, Mishloach Manot, and in Yiddush, Shalach-manos. Charitable donations to those in need are also encouraged.

Passover/Pesach

The name Pesach comes from the Hebrew root Peh-Samech-Chet, which means to pass over, to pass through or to spare. It refers to the time in Ancient Egypt, when G-D passed over the homes of the Hebrews and slew the firstborn of all the Egyptians. Thus the English name for Pesach is Passover. Pesach is also the name of the sacrificial offering (the lamb) that was made in the Temple on the holiday.

The removal of Chametz (leaven) from our homes, the most significant observance, commemorates the fact that the Hebrews had to leave Egypt so quickly that they could not wait for the bread to rise, resulting in unleavened bread. Chametz includes the five major grains --wheat, barley, rye, oats and spelt that are not completely cooked in eighteen minutes after coming into contact with water. Jews of Ashkenazic backgrounds also avoid corn, rice, legumes and peanuts. We are not permitted to eat Chametz during Passover. We are to thoroughly clean our homes and remove any traces of Chametz. We are to avoid using any utensils, cookware, dishes, etc. that have been used to cook or serve Chametz. We eat matzoh, which is made of flour and water and is unleavened.

Passover lasts for 8 days and begins at sundown before the first day. We celebrate the beginning of Passover with a Seder on each of the first two nights. Seder is derived from the Hebrew root, meaning order. There is a specific set of information and ritual discussed in a specific order. This is set forth in a book called the Haggadah. The Haggadah tells the story of the Exodus from Egypt and explains practices and symbols of our holiday and our celebration of freedom from bondage and freedom of worship.

Passover is a time to gather with friends and family and others who are alone or in need to retell the story, relive the past, observe the ritual and traditions, eat heartily, celebrate our freedom and thank G-D for all these blessings.

Shavuot

Shavuot is a major festival that is celebrated 50 days after Passover. It marks the giving of the Torah by G-D to the Jewish people on Mt. Sinai over 3300 years ago. The word Shavuot is the Hebrew word for weeks and represents the seven weeks when the Jewish people prepared themselves for receiving the Torah. It was a time to remove the scars of slavery and become a holy nation prepared to stand before G-D

G-D's giving of the Torah to the Jewish people and their receiving it from G-d is a spiritual event of major proportion. It touched the essence of the Jewish soul then and for all time. The sages have compared it to a wedding between G-D and the Jewish people. We became a special nation and G-D became our G-D. Therefore Shavuot is a time for us to reawaken and further strengthen our special relationship with G-D. We can rededicate ourselves to the observance and study of Torah, our special heritage.

Candles are lit eighteen minutes before sunset. A dairy meal is generally eaten and it is a custom to adorn the synagogue with greens and flowers. At morning services, the Ten Commandments are read. Tefilin are not put on. It is also a custom to stay up all night, the night of Shavuoth, and study Torah --- TIKUN LAIL SHAVUOTH.



Natan Sharansky and SAFAM Highlight Birnbaum Lecture

The Synagogue Council of Massachusetts is proud to announce that Natan Sharansky, the iconic symbol of the Soviet Jewry movement and current Chairman of the Jewish Agency for Israel (JAFI), will deliver the 9th annual Connie Spear Birnbaum Memorial Lecture. Sharansky's talk, entitled "Risks to Our Future: Together We Can Win!," will take place on **Sunday, March 11th at 7:30 pm at Congregation Mishkan Tefila, Chestnut Hill** (doors open at 7:00).

The Boston-based SAFAM, with their unique Jewish-American sound, will perform several numbers that evening, including *Leaving Mother Russia*, written 25 years ago about Sharansky's struggle for freedom from Soviet oppression.

The Birnbaum Lecture is named in memory of Connie Spear Birnbaum, who worked at the Synagogue Council of Massachusetts for many years towards an ideal of uniting the entire Jewish people - K'lal Yisrael. The program -- which includes a musical prelude (piano, cello, violin) and light refreshments -- is free and open to the public.
