My Prayers For Peace

My very dear friends,

I write this column with a heavy heart. As I write, the violence in Israel and Gaza has just come to an uneasy end. I pray first of all that this truce will last and that Hamas will honor its agreement not to launch further missiles at Israel.

I pray also that the parties will be working honestly on a long-term solution to allow the people of Israel and Gaza to live as neighbors and raise their children in peace.

I have more hope about my first prayer than my second. Sadly, there are many indicators that the determination of Hamas to destroy Israel and drive the Jews out of the whole land from the Jordan River to the Mediterranean will not abate, not now and not in the foreseeable future. So long as Hamas maintains a dominant position within the politics of the Palestinians without abandoning its antipathy to Israel, peace between Palestinians and Israel will remain beyond reach.

During these times in particular, it's likely that we will have conversations about Israel and her future security and wellbeing, including at times conversations with people who are not sympathetic to Israel's concerns.

My third prayer is that we will find ways to conduct all those conversations in a civil and respectful manner.

This in no way is meant to suggest that we ought not be clear and determined in our support of Israel. We face a clear choice in the Middle East. Some of the actors there, and particularly Hamas, are evil. They are evil in their methods and evil in their motives. They mean to do us harm, as they plainly say in their statements and demonstrate in their actions.

To find the clearest expression of that evil in the conduct of Hamas, apart from the rocket attacks now thankfully abated, we need look no further than the disgusting scenes we saw on TV of Hamas supporters distributing chocolates in celebration of the wounding of Israeli civilians by a bomb placed on a bus in Tel Aviv. Our side goes to enormous lengths to avoid civilian casualties, and regrets and grieves their occurrence. Their side deliberately aims their rockets and missiles at civilian targets and embeds the launchers among civilians in order to show on TV the bloodied bodies of innocent children.

What are we to do with this painful dilemma, the dilemma that we recognize that Hamas is evil and yet combating Hamas, as Israel must, has horrendous consequences for the Palestinians in Gaza? One answer may be found in the tripartite wisdom of Hillel.

First of all, "Im eyn ani li, mi li?" "If I am not for myself, who will be for me?" If we do not stand up for Israel, who will stand up for her? And if she does not defend herself and her citizens, to whom can she turn for help? Of course she must act, and she cannot be deterred by the enemy's disregard for the safety of its own citizens.

Second, when we watch the heartbreaking video on TV showing women and children in Gaza harmed by the conflict, we weep for them because, as Hillel taught us, "*U'ch'she'ani l'atzmi, ma ani?*" "And if I am for myself alone, what am I?"

This paradox, our eagerness to see Israel safe once more and our pain at witnessing the ways she must proceed to try to achieve that safety, leads us to the third clause in this mishnah: "V'im lo achshav eymatai?" "If not now, when?"

The third clause reminds us that we have to live with paradox, but we cannot allow the paradox to paralyze us. We have to take a stand when it is time to take a stand.

And so, I pray that we will stand with Israel, and support her as she continues the long struggle to protect her citizens while keeping alive the dream of peace with her neighbors.

In whatever way this phase of what seems an endless conflict may be resolved, I pray finally that the leaders of both Israel and the Palestinians will place the legitimate interests and needs of their citizens in the forefront of their thoughts and find the wisdom to work toward real peace.

May God spread over us and over Israel the shelter of His peace.

On November 4, a group of temple members had the privilege of attending the Eagle Scout Court of Honor for Eddie Flaherty at Braintree Town Hall. Rabbi Van Lanckton gave the Invocation and the Benediction. The ceremony included some Eagle Scout ceremonies and special presentations as well as the Eagle Scout Awards for both Eddie Flaherty and Nicholas Hall.

Eddie began scouting with Pack 22 and as a Cub Scout, he earned the Arrow of Light. After transferring to Boy Scout Troop 22 in 2006, he earned the rank of Scout in June 2006 and Tenderfoot by January 2007. By January 2008, he completed the requirements for Second Class and was elected to Assistant Patrol Leader in September 2008. In January 2009, he completed the requirements for First Class and was elected Patrol Leader the following September. While spending a week at summer camp, he was elected to the Order of the Arrow. Also in June 2009, Eddie attended the National Youth Leadership Training. In June 2010, he completed the requirements for Star, completed Brotherhood in the Order of the Arrow and was re-elected Patrol Leader in September. In June 2011, he completed the requirements for Life, and was elected to Troop Quartermaster in September and began planning his Eagle Project. In addition to the Eagle Scout Award, Eddie has earned 35 Merit Badges.

Three Winter Jewish Holidays

Happy Chanukah!

Chanukah, the Festival of Lights, is celebrated for eight days, from the twenty-fifth day of the Hebrew month of Kislev to the third day of the following month, Tevet. The celebration begins with the lighting of the first Chanukah candle at the end of 24 Kislev. This year, Chanukah thus begins on the evening of December 8 and ends on December 16.

We use a special candle holder, an eight-branch menorah known as the "Hannukiah." It holds eight candles, one for each night, plus one helper candle, the shamash [meaning "attendant" or "servant"], used to light the others. We say special prayers as we light the shamash and first one candle and then progressively additional candles, two the second night, three the third night, and so on until the eighth night, when we light eight candles from the shamash.

It is traditional to place the candles in the Hannukiah from the right and light them from the left. This tradition derives from the notion that each candle represents a specific day. Placing the candles from the right acknowledges the ascending order of the days, beginning with the first day of the holiday. Lighting the candles from the left recognizes the primacy of the individual night. The first candle lit each night is the newest candle, the candle for that specific night. As we place the candles in the Hannukiah, from oldest to newest, we light them from newest to oldest and in doing so sanctify each day individually and as a part of the greater festival of Chanukah.

As the candles flicker and glow, we sing songs, exchange gifts and play a game with a spinning top, called a dreidel. We eat potato pancakes ("latkes") with either applesauce or sour cream and sometimes jelly doughnuts [in Hebrew called " sufganiyot"]. The latkes and sufganiyot are foods cooked in oil in recognition of the sacred oil that is part of the legend of Chanukah.

We have two sources for the story of Chanukah in our tradition, sources that are supplemented by modern scholarship. Two non-canonical books, the First and Second Book of Maccabees, depict a national resistance against a foreign political and cultural oppression, a revolt known as the Maccabean Revolt, led by Judah Maccabee. In the Talmud that story is told but the focus is on the miracle of oil that should have lasted for only one day lasting instead for eight. The Talmud says that oil for ritual use in the Temple in Jerusalem was despoiled by the Greek rulers. Although a supply of proper oil sufficient for one day was found, it took eight days to replenish it. The oil miraculously lasted for those eight days.

Modern scholars tell a different story. They argue that King Antiochus intervened in a civil war between the traditionalist Jews in the country and the Hellenized Jews in Jerusalem. There is support for the conclusion that the traditionalists contested with the Hellenizers over who would be the High Priest. The conflict escalated when the Hellenistic kingdom of Syria sided with the Hellenizing Jews in their conflict with the traditionalists. Antiochus took the side of the Hellenizers by prohibiting the religious practices in the Temple.

Whatever may be the historical validity of the story we tell, Chanukah stands as a reminder of the possibility of renewal, a reminder that we celebrate each year in the darkest time: the holiday coincides with the change of lunar months and therefore the times of the darkest nights, and also occurs annually near the winter solstice, when the nights are longest. We celebrate the miracle of renewal every year at Chanukah by recalling the memory of the brave Maccabees and their men who fought for religious freedom and won.

Purim

Each year on the fourteenth day of the Hebrew month of Adar we celebrate Purim and remember the story of the beautiful Jewish girl, Esther, who became Queen of Persia, the wife of King Ahasueros who fell in love with her. Purim is celebrated this year on February 24, 2013.

As described in the Book of Esther, the king's evil minister, Haman, hated the Jews, especially Mordecai, Esther's uncle. Haman did not know that Esther was a Jew. He told the king lies about the Jews and tricked him into signing a decree that on a particular day, every Jew in Persia would be murdered. Esther risked her life by telling the king that she was a Jew and about Haman's lies and plans to destroy all the Jews. The Jews were saved and Haman was put to death.

Purim is a time of celebration. We read the story of Esther in a scroll, the Megillah. Whenever Haman's name is mentioned, we boo, hiss, stamp our feet and twirl noisemakers. We dress in costumes, often wearing crowns like Queen Esther and King Ahasueros or three-cornered hats like wicked Haman. We eat delicious three cornered pastries, hamantaschen, filled with fruit, representing Haman's hat. It is a holiday of celebration and rejoicing.

Tu Bishvat

Tu Bishvat, the fifteenth day of the Hebrew month of Shvat, will be celebrated on January 26, 2013. On Tu Bishvat, children plant trees and seeds and eat fruit and nuts that come from trees, such as orange, carob and almond, which grow in Israel. In this hot dry land of Israel, trees are very important and people often make donations so that trees can be planted there. To plant a tree in Israel in honor or memory of a loved one, call Carol Savas 781-344-9377.
