## Message from the Rabbi Ma'ayan Sands

Dear TBS community,

From a place where we are right, flowers will never grow"-a poem by Yehudah Amichai

Thanksgiving is almost upon us. Although it is not officially a "Jewish" holiday, it represents what Judaism and Jews are all about. It is a celebration of our blessings: our families and friends, the rights we enjoy, all of creation and the opportunities open to us. It's also a time to reflect on how we as Americans — and as Jews — can help stop the immense injustices faced by millions around the world and here at home.

The worldwide community has been so shaken by violence recently. My message to you will, I hope, serve as a virtual hug. It includes a short poem by Yehudah Amichai, one of the greatest Israeli poets, certainly in modern time. Its message is simple and clear, poignant and it is true. If I could, I would put it in the inbox of every world leader and others in powerful positions.

#### The Place Where We Are Right

by Yehuda Amichai

From the place where we are right flowers will never grow in the Spring.

The place where we are right is hard and trampled like a yard.

But doubts and loves dig up the world like a mole, a plough. And a whisper will be heard in the place where the ruined house once stood.

If you consider the political context in which "The Place Where We Are Right" was written, the poem's power multiplies.

Parker Palmer, thinker and educator par excellence, articulated a question which arose for him as he reflected on Amichai's poem: How might things change if we began our political conversations not from our certainties, but from our "doubts and loves"? Indeed, how different so many of our everyday conversations would be if they didn't begin from "the place where we are right"?

It is well known that people do not remember what we say, but how we make them feel. I suspect that many of our conversations, most of the interaction we have with each other would look and sound very different if we could remember that

I hope each of you has a wonderful and delicious Thanksgiving celebration. I hope it includes thoughtful sharing about what each of you is grateful for. If you are anxious about getting together with friends and family because politics will inevitably come up and those conversations often don't feel good, think about this poem. Maybe even read it aloud to your guests (or with permission, for your host). Invite people to share their thoughts about the poem. Consider reminding them that we all remember better, and for longer, how we make each other feel, rather than what was actually said.

It has been more than a month since that tragic massacre at the Tree of Life Congregation in Pittsburgh. Our hearts are still saddened by the killings. In the wake of this incident and the further mass killing in California, the board has taken action to further enhance security at the temple. To begin with, the doors will be locked at all times. Additionally, we are looking at security cameras with the possibility of a doorbell/ buzzer needed for entrance. We are also working with the police department for additional monitoring and security whenever warranted. You will be hearing more once plans are finalized.

In looking back over the fall period, it has been very busy and exciting with several terrific events, beginning with our High Holiday Day services under the leadership of Rabbi Ma'ayan Sands and our cantor Seth Grossman. We had a great turnout and it was so nice to see everyone. The High Holiday Day services always provide a wonderful opportunity to visit with old friends and come together as a temple family. We received extremely positive feedback on the services!! Thank you, Stacey Bloom, for your inspiring Israel Bond appeal speech. It's not too late for investing in Israel Bonds if you haven't done so already.

Next came the opportunity to celebrate the holiday of Sukkot in our Sukkah. Our Men's Club did the set up and our students from the religious school did the decorating with the assistance of Judy Karll. Our religious school remains vibrant and our students are learning a great deal. Our cantor, Seth Grossman, teaches our Thursday night religious school, with students learning all about the weekly parshas and Shabbat services. Solomon Borocov continues with our Sunday morning class. Thank you to both of you for undertaking this role.

Our annual congregational meeting drew a large crowd and was held in conjunction with the Men's Club breakfast. As always, the food was delicious. Thank you to the crew that helped in the kitchen. The temple budget for the 2018-2019 year was approved as was a two-year contract for Rabbi Sands. In addition, a summary of the survey was provided with considerable discussion about the need for a handicap accessible bathroom and handicap accessible to the building.

The board will be pursuing the options available and reporting back to the congregation.

Sisterhood held a very successful rummage sale. Thank you to all the many helpers. Sisterhood will be holding its annual Chanukah Brunch on December 16 at the Granite Grill. We are all looking forward to a Chanukah Candle lighting at the temple on Thursday, December 6 beginning at 6:30 P.M. (bring your own Chanukah menorah to light) and a family Chanukah Kiddush to be held on Saturday, December 8 at the temple. Delicious potato latkes will be served at both events! Mark them on your calendar. Judy Karll is organizing a "Mitzvah of Giving" program in conjunction with the religious school, collecting unwrapped new toys to give to children less fortunate during the holidays. The deadline for dropping them off to the temple is Sunday, December 9.

What continues to be so heartening is to see the number of people who work so hard to make these events happen. At the same time, we held our weekly Shabbat services with good participation and had individuals helping in the kitchen so that all could enjoy a Kiddush following the service. Come and join us for a Shabbat service. You will be pleasantly surprised. Services start "around" 9:15ish, but you can come anytime you feel comfortable up to and including the Kiddush. I hope you had an opportunity to participate in some or all the events that have been, and will be, held. We are fortunate to have members who continuously volunteer their time to help out. Thank you to all who give of their time to make our temple a better place for all. We could use more of you, however! Consider volunteering a few hours in the kitchen for a Shabbat or help with some shopping. ## THE MAYOR OF BRAINTREE, JOSEPH C. SULLIVAN

Dear Rabbi,

Our mutual friend, Dr. Peter Kurzberg, had invited me to attend your services this morning and I had hoped to do so. However, due to a family obligation I am unable to join with you. I shall be with your congregation in the near future as I have enjoyed my many visits in the past.

Please know that I offer my best wishes and a warm embrace on behalf of Braintree as we all still grapple with the terrible tragedy that took place in Pittsburgh. The lives lost, the lasting impact on their families, as well as the effect on the wider Jewish community is felt by all.

As Mayor of a caring town I can attest to the humanity and love that so many of our people provide for one another and our community. Unfortunately, I have witnessed that there are people here in Braintree and beyond our borders who are not so accepting and are quick to identify what they view to be perceived flaws rather than the strength that diversity offers. I don't know where this attitude comes from. Perhaps it is embedded in their family tree or they have learned somehow that hatred is somehow a benefit to them. It is not. Instead, we know that the benefits of tolerance and love overcomes fear and bigotry every time. I believe and am hopeful that we can replace that lack of understanding that some have for other faiths through education and with the practice of brotherly love. In doing so we shall see acts of violence erode and fade away.

In the words of Pittsburgh native Fred Rogers, "Love is at the root of everything, all learning, all understanding. Love or the lack of it." Truly words to live by.

#### FROM RABBI SANDS

My dear friends,

Many thanks to those of you who were able to come for services yesterday. We shared a peaceful and meaningful morning, praying, learning and just being together. It was wonderful; just what the doctor ordered, for all of us.

I am especially grateful to have welcomed a new friend, Bob Murray. Bob is a Catholic member of the Braintree community who contacted us, wanting to show his support for his Jewish neighbors at this challenging time for all of us. He is grateful that he was able to come and share the service and the learning with us. We are very appreciative of his having reached out to us so full of love and compassion. In addition, yesterday I shared with the community a touching and compassionate letter of support from Mayor Joseph Sullivan. I believe his words will be shared with you via email.

At this time of giving thanks on our secular calendar, I also want you to know that Reverend Liz Williams, on behalf of herself and her congregation, the Wollaston Congregational Church in Quincy, has reached out to me and to you with a very sweet and generous note of recognition and offers of support at this difficult time for all of us.

My friends, we are a very warm, welcoming and caring community and in our time of need, our non-Jewish neighbors are telling us loud and clear that we are not alone. We Jews are taught to acknowledge the potential for being uplifted.... every day. In Psalm 30, which we recite each morning, the author begins his prayer by saying: aromim'kha, "I raise You up, God, I extol You, O Lord, because You lifted me up! You helped me." In verse 6 we read: "One may lie down weeping at nightfall, but at dawn there are shouts of joy." While this does not mean literally overnight, we know that over time, our fear and our mourning can turn to a feeling of being comforted and supported. Today, we know that is true, because we feel the effects of our caring neighbors, people of faith who are God's partners on earth. When we say "Thank You, God" it might feel like a pious platitude. But it might also be a way to look at life, our way to look at life. It is a statement of faith in the One who lifted us up and also a statement of faith and gratitude to our neighbors, our partners as co-creators, with God. By doing so, we affirm to ourselves and others that God is real. And that is a blessing for God and for all of us.

I hope that each of you and your families and friends, will have a Thanksgiving celebration that will be both physically and metaphysically, nourishing. May you share many robust expressions of gratitude and delicious togetherness in love and peace.

# Listening to Other Voices: The Impact of Elie Wiesel presented by Rabbi Joseph Polak

The Glastonbury Abbey Listening to Other Voices lecture series was established in the fall of 1999 to foster interfaith dialog. Each year a different general topic is presented and speakers are engaged to address it from the perspective of their own faith tradition. The topic for the series year 2018-2019 is "Prophets of the 20th Century: What Do They Say to Us Now?"

This evening's discussion will examine the impact of Elie Wiesel in our times, as interpreted by his "rabbi" and close personal friend, Rabbi Joseph Polak.

With sad eyes and quiet strength, this survivor of Auschwitz told the world it must never forget the Nazi horror. "Because if we forget," he said, "we are guilty, we are accomplices." Mr. Wiesel, who wrote 60 books including his seminal Holocaust memoir, Night, was the Andrew W. Mellon Professor in the Humanities at Boston University. He received the Nobel Peace Prize in 1986.

Presenter: Rabbi Joseph A. Polakis the Boston University faculty colleague and friend of Mr. Wiesel, who referred to Joe Polak as "my rabbi." A native of The Hague, Netherlands, Rabbi Polak was an infant survivor of two concentration camps. His memoir, After the Holocaust the Bells Still Ring, won a 2015 National Jewish Book Award.

# & THIS YEAR IS DOUBLE ADAR

Unlike a secular leap year, which has merely one additional day, a Jewish leap year includes an additional month, causing confusion that necessitated rabbinical rulings.

Glancing at your Jewish calendars may sometimes be cause for confusion. That's because in some years the Hebrew month of Adar seems to extend significantly longer than 30 days.

Indeed, unlike a secular leap year, which includes merely one additional day, a Jewish leap year has an additional month, a second Adar. This additional month, which surfaces seven times within a 19-year cycle, is an essential Torahmandated appendage, primarily intended to ensure that <a href="Pesach (Passover">Pesach (Passover)</a> will never fall in the winter.

The Torah tells us that Pesach must be observed "in the spring." With the lunar calendar being "behind" the solar calendar by 11 days each year, sooner or later <u>Chanukah</u> would fall in July and Pesach in December – an unacceptable arrangement.

This additional month of Adar does make for some legitimate confusion. For starters, which Adar is the real one – the first or the second? This Adar ambiguity is especially evident with regard to the observance of lifecycle events and, perhaps most important, Purim.

Conveniently, with regard to <u>Purim</u>, the Mishna (rabbinic literature) is very clear in ruling that the reading of Megillat Esther (The Book of Esther) and other related *mitzvot* (commandments) of Purim must be observed in the second Adar, making the first Adar appear to be the supplementary one. Nevertheless, the first Adar is viewed with some sanctity as well. For example, according to many authorities, the halachic <u>requirement to be joyful in the month of Adar</u> also applies to the first Adar. An interesting complication of a double Adar is that in many instances, if two people enter into a "yearlong" agreement, and it is then discovered that there's an additional Adar that year, the agreement may be binding for 13 months!

The laws of mourning are somewhat different. They are actually a unit classified as "12 months" and not "one year." As odd as this may sound, in a year containing a second Adar, mourning restrictions will nevertheless cease after 12 months, even though an entire calendar year may not have passed.

The laws as they apply to a *yahrzeit* (anniversary of a person's death) are distinctive as well, with no definitive opinion on how to conduct oneself. Some authorities rule that all Adar yahrzeits are to be observed in the second Adar, while others rule that they are to be observed in the first. There is, of course, an additional opinion which rules that a yahrzeit is to be observed in both Adars!

With regard to a bar mitzvah, the practice is, by and large, as follows: If there were two Adars in both the year that the boy was born and again in the year of the bar mitzvah, then everything is straightforward. If, however, the boy was born in a year that had one Adar, and in the year of his bar mitzvah there are two Adars, then the bar mitzvah is to take place in the second Adar. Here's something intriguing: it is actually conceivable for a boy who is younger to become bar mitzvah before one who is older! For example, a boy born on the 10th of Adar II will become bar mitzvah before a boy born on the eighteenth of Adar I, if in their bar mitzvah year there's only one Adar!

Blessed are You, Lord our G-d, King of the universe, who has granted us life, sustained us, and enabled us to reach this occasion.
